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Archives of Neuropsychiatry is a peer reviewed scientific journal that publishes articles on psychiatry, neurology, and behavioural sciences. Both clinical and basic science contributions are welcomed. Submissions that address topics in the interface of neurology and psychiatry are encouraged. The content covers original research articles, reviews, letters to the editor, and case reports.

The audience of the journal includes neurologists, psychiatrists, and other scientists and clinicians working in related fields.

The editorial and publication processes of the journal are shaped in accordance with the guidelines of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE), World Association of Medical Editors (WAME), Council of Science Editors (CSE), Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE), European Association of Science Editors (EASE), and National Information Standards Organization (NISO). The journal is in conformity with the Principles of Transparency and Best Practice in Scholarly Publishing (doaj.org/bestpractice).

- Acknowledgment of the individuals who contributed to the preparation of the manuscript but who do not fulfill the authorship criteria.

PREPARATION OF THE MANUSCRIPT

Articles should be written with "Times New Roman" character, 12 font size and 1.5 line spacing and saved in Microsoft Word format (docx). All acronyms and abbreviations used in the manuscript

should be defined at first use, both in the abstract and in the main text. The abbreviation should be provided in parentheses following the definition.

When a drug, product, hardware, or software program is mentioned within the main text, product information, including the name of the product, the producer of the product, and city and the country of the company (including the state if in USA), should be provided in parentheses in the following format: "Discovery St PET/CT scanner (General Electric, Milwaukee, WI, USA)" All references, tables, and figures should be referred to within the main text, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text.

Statistical analyses must be conducted in accordance with international statistical reporting standards (see; Altman DG, Gore SM, Gardner MJ, Pocock SJ. Statistical guidelines for contributors to medical journals. *Br Med J* 1983; 7; 1489-93). The statistical software that was used must be specified.

Units should be prepared in accordance with the International System of Units (SI).

Title: Titles of articles should be both concise yet comprehensive and descriptive. Titles framed as questions are only accepted for articles submitted in "letter to the editor" format.

Abstract: An English abstract should accompany all submissions except for Letters to the Editor. Abstracts in Turkish are not expected from international authors. The abstract of Original Articles and Review Articles must be structured with subheadings (Introduction, Methods, Results, and Conclusion). The abstract of case reports must be structured with subheadings (Introduction, Case and Conclusion). Abstracts should be within the word limit of 250-300. Please check Table 1 below for the details.

Keywords: Each submission must be accompanied by a minimum of 3 to a maximum of 6 keywords listed in alphabetical order at the end of the abstract. The keywords should be selected from the National Library of Medicine, Medical Subject Headings (MeSH) database (<https://www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/MBrowser.html>).

Highlights: This section is of high prominence for the discoverability of the articles via search engines and for the promotion of the articles in digital media. 3 to 5 highlights should be provided for each article including research articles, case reports, reviews and letters to the editor. Highlights can be novel results, novel methods used or striking findings and important conclusions of the article. They should be written as short sentences of maximum 85 characters (including spaces) and organized as a bulleted list.

The Editorial Board reserves the right to make any modifications it deems appropriate to the "title," "keywords," and "highlights" informing authors of the changes.

Manuscript Types

Research Articles: The main text of research articles should be organized under the subtitles of Introduction, Methods, Results,

and Discussion. The Introduction should include the rationale of the study, and the objective and hypothesis of the study should be clearly stated in the last paragraph. The "Methods" section must include the subsections of "participants", "design", "instruments", "statistics" and "ethics". The "Results" section includes the findings of the study, supported with tables and figures to facilitate reading. The "Discussion" should include the authors' conclusions, limitations and strengths of the study and a comparison with the relevant literature. Please check Table 1 below for word count specifications.

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Brief Reports: These are manuscripts that report either original research or novel ideas dealing with important theoretical or practical problems related to specific subjects. Brief report articles (excluding title page, references, table / figure / picture) should not exceed 2500 words. Please check Table 1 below for word count specifications.

Letters to the Editor: These manuscripts include evaluation and criticisms submitted by the experts in the field or the reviewers of a manuscript regarding manuscripts previously published in the journal. The authors of manuscripts that become topics of letters to the editor are provided with the opportunity to respond to the comments that are raised. Letters are published together with the responses of the author(s) of the manuscript concerned where possible.

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Introduction of websites: These manuscripts introduce websites relevant to the scope of the journal.

Book Section: These manuscripts introduce the books/theses published on subjects related to the scope of the journal. The text of manuscripts in the special section must not exceed 500 words (excluding the references, tables, and figures or legends). Up to five references and either one table or one figure are allowed.

Tables

Tables should be included in the main document, presented after the reference list, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text. A descriptive title must be placed above the tables. Abbreviations used in the tables should be defined below the tables by footnotes (even if they are defined within the main text). These abbreviations should be listed in alphabetical order and separated by semicolons (ADHD: Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder; OCD: Obsessive Compulsive Disorder). Tables should be created using the "insert table" command of the word processing software and they should be arranged clearly to provide easy reading. Data presented in the tables should not be a repetition of the data presented within the main text but should be supporting the main text.

Figures and Figure Legends

Figures, graphics, and photographs should be submitted as separate files (in TIFF or JPEG format) through the submission system. The files should not be embedded in a Word document or the main document. When there are figure subunits, the subunits should not be merged to form a single image. Each subunit should be submitted separately through the submission system. Images should not be labelled (a, b, c, etc.) to indicate figure subunits. Thick and thin arrows, arrowheads, stars, asterisks, and similar marks can be used on the images to support figure legends. Like the rest of the submission, the figures should be blind. Any information within the images that may indicate an individual or an institution should be blinded. For this reason, the persons in the pictures should not be recognized and institutional information should also be deleted. The minimum resolution of each submitted figure should be 300 DPI. To prevent delays in the evaluation process, all submitted figures should be clear in resolution and large in size (minimum dimensions: 100 × 100 mm). Figure legends should be listed at the end of the main document.

References

While citing, preference should be given to the latest, most up-to-date publications. If an ahead-of-print publication is cited, the DOI number should be provided. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of references. Journal titles should be abbreviated in accordance with the journal abbreviations in Index Medicus/MEDLINE/PubMed. In articles with 6 or less authors, all authors should be listed in each reference. In articles with more than 6 authors, sixth authors' name should be followed by "et al.". In the main text of the manuscript, references should be cited using Arabic numbers in parentheses. Reference styles for different types of publications are presented in the following examples.

REVISIONS

In the revised files prepared based on the reviewers comments, all changes made to the main text must be clearly marked in a different color or saved in "track changes" format. Notes addressing the reviewers' suggestions and comments must be included in a separate document titled "Revision Notes." In this document, each reviewer's comment should first be stated, followed by the author's response. Additionally, the specific line numbers where changes have been made should be indicated.

Revised manuscripts must be submitted within three months following the notification letter requesting revisions. If the revisions are not submitted within the specified period, the evaluation process may be terminated. Should the authors require an extension for submitting revisions, they must notify the journal of their request prior to the expiration of the three-month deadline.

Manuscripts accepted for publication are copy-edited for grammar, punctuation, and formatting. The print-ready PDF versions of accepted manuscripts are sent to the corresponding authors, who are required to return their approval to the journal within two days. Articles are made available in an early online format on the journal's website prior to the publication of the issue in which they are included.

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An article processing fee is charged for all types of manuscripts accepted for publication following the scientific evaluation process. The article processing charge (APC) is \$200 USD for members of the Turkish Neuropsychiatric Association and \$250 USD for non-members. Authors who have served as reviewers for Archives of Neuropsychiatry within the past three years are entitled to a reduced APC of \$150 USD, applicable to their first manuscript submission.
